BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen welcomed its newest member John Hall to the Board and said good bye to Katie O'Donnell and thanked her for her commitment and service to the citizens of Marshfield.

The year was an extremely challenging year on the budgetary side with further reduction in personnel and our ability to deliver services to our residents, both on the school and town side of Government. This trend continues as we prepare the FY2011 budget for Town Meeting approval. This year will prove to be even more challenging, because for the first time residents will feel and see the reduction in town services brought about by the 2nd straight year of reduced revenues and reduced local aid which translates into layoffs. On January 21, 2010, the Board of Selectmen hosted the "State of the Town" to help our citizens and residents better understand the budgetary constraints of reductions in local aid and local receipts and how those reductions will impact departments and what reductions in services one might expect to see.

On a more positive note, Town Meeting gave initial approval for the Selectmen to enter into a contract with an Environmental Service Company to do an initial energy audit. The energy audit will identify areas that our town could save and reduce our energy consumption that in turn would lower our overall energy costs. These savings can then be transferred to pay for the energy improvements that will lower our consumption of energy and make our buildings more efficient at no cost to the taxpayers. This process is revenue neutral. You will hear more about this exciting and innovative program in the future.

In June, the fiscal team presented to the Board, the Reserve Fund Policy, another in a series of sound financial policies that the fiscal team has brought forward to protect our finances and put our town in a very good position for an increase in our bond rating in the near future. Our great bond rating of AA is very important during these very difficult times because it allows us to borrow money at great rates which in turn is a savings for our taxpayers.

As we go to print, the war on terrorism continues and young men and women from Marshfield continue to serve our Country with great honor and distinction. Thanks to our great Veteran's Agent, Dick Martin, our veterans, their spouses and children are never forgotten and they receive all the benefits that they are entitled too. Of course, a job of this magnitude could not be accomplished without assistance from the Assistant Veteran's Agent and scores of volunteers. One particular volunteer was recognized for her work of mailing boxes of goodies to our service men and women throughout the year and at Christmas time. She is also responsible for mailing out monthly, over 1,000 Bugle newsletters to veterans and their families. For her dedication to our veterans, Anne Treadwell was presented the Bugle Award. This award is presented each year by the Board at the direction of the Veteran's Agent to an individual that goes above and beyond their volunteer duties assisting our veterans. Sadly, after many years of service to our veterans, Dick Martin has retired. The Board appointed a search committee that vetted a number of candidates that had applied for the position down to three candidates for the Board to interview and vote to appoint. The public interview by the Board took place on December 28,

2009 and upon completion of our interview, the Board deliberated and unanimously voted to appoint William Dodge as our new Veteran's Agent.

On June 9th, "Dandelion Day" the Board was invited to participate in the ground breaking of a new park in the middle of our downtown at the site of the old abandoned Gulf Station. This site will be home to the new park in honor of Molly Fitzgerald and all the other children who have died much too early in life. The Molly Fitzgerald Memorial Fund is donating this park to the town. The ribbon cutting is scheduled for June 9th, 2010.

As summer was fast approaching, the Board once again sponsored for the 7th year, the Summer Safety Fair held at the Town Pier on June 20, 2009. More than three hundred residents and children attended the fair and received summer safety tips from the Police, Fire, Life guards, Coast Guard, Environmental Police and Harbormaster. Residents could also have a free ride around the harbor from the Harbormaster's staff while dining on some very traditional summer food staples donated through the generosity of Star Market and Roche Bros. The hot dogs, hamburgers and sausages were grilled to perfection by the Selectmen.

On July 4th the Board celebrated our Nation's birthday by hosting a public meeting on the historic Town Green at 9:00AM to read the Declaration of Independence. The Board received assistance once again from the Historical Commission, who with the participation of Marshfield's youth, acted out a small skit about life in a Colonial family.

In July, the Board unanimously voted to extend the Boys and Girls Club lease at Library Plaza through December 31, 2011. The Boys and Girls Club membership has grown to over 1,300 families and they look forward to break ground at their new site located on Proprietors Drive as soon as possible.

Even though the economy has been challenging, the town did receive a financial donation from NSTAR in the amount of \$1,000 for the Energy Committee and from Shoreline Aviation \$2,600 for training and equipment for our Fire Department.

As part of our quest to put into place a strategic plan for the town, the Board embarked upon three neighborhood meetings that really were listening tours for the Board to hear from residents about issues that they are concerned about but never really had the opportunity to present them directly to the Board. The "Listening Tours" were held at St. Anne's Parish Hall, the Congregation Church Hall and the GAR Hall during the summer. The meetings lasted a few hours and over 150 residents participated. Everyone who wanted to speak had the opportunity. Many of the requests and suggestions have been acted upon.

Between January and May, the Board will be taking their meetings on the road to explore and showcase some of the hidden treasures in our town. It is anticipated that 3-4 sites will be visited. Sites under review include the following potential sites; Brant Rock Chapel, Clift Rodgers Library, Sowing Seeds, YWCA, Marcia Thomas House and the Recreation Center at Coast Guard Hill.

The Dyer Memorial was installed at the corner of South River and Main Street (3A) in front of the Marshfield Fair Administration Building not too far from where Officer Dyer was tragically run down on a site approved by the Board of Selectmen. Marshfield will also have a new playground thanks to the efforts of Marshfield Kids at Play in Library Plaza. The Board was invited to the groundbreaking that took place on October 10, 2009. Many of our young families and their children anxiously await the opening of this new playground this summer.

After six long years of planning and permitting, the dredging of the inner harbor began (November 2009) and is expected to be completed by the end of January 2010. The inner harbor has not been dredged in over 25 years and has presented some very difficult and dangerous working conditions for our commercial fishing fleet. Special thanks to Congressman Delahunt for securing the federal funds (\$3 million) necessary to complete the dredge and matched by town funds.

In November, the Town of Marshfield received national recognition in the form of a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for FY09 by the Massachusetts Government Finance Officers Association. This recognition highlights the great work that the financial team has done to provide financial data that was accurate, organized and recognizable for non-financial people to understand and interpret. In December, the Town of Marshfield received the Common Cause Award for our website for reporting meeting minutes, posting of agendas, town bylaws and budget information. Both of these awards showcase the commitment by the Board to have transparency and openness in government information supplied by town government. It has been our goal to make it easier for our citizens to see what is happening in their government, who is meeting where and when, what are the laws governing our community and more importantly where are the dollars and how are they being spent.

In the end, it has been a very busy year for the Board. Even though the financial strains have been complicated and challenging our department heads and employees have risen to the challenge and have worked together keeping government moving forward for our citizens. I also wanted to thank the schools for their spirit of cooperation participating as a member of the financial team as true partners in government.

The Board of Selectmen would like to thank Rocco Longo, our Town Administrator, who has been doing a superb job of running the day to day operations of Town Government on behalf of our employees, residents and taxpayers. His leadership and ability to motivate have had a profound effect on our employees and department heads, energizing and directing their day to day operations. Finally, the Board of Selectmen could not represent our town if it were not for the organizational skills and the abilities of Beverly Wiedemann and Kate Burke to keep all the information and correspondence organized, phone calls answered and information available. For their dedication to the citizens of Marshfield we say thank you.

TOWN CLERK

The Town Clerk is an elected official of Marshfield having administrative and supervisory responsibility for the care and keeping of all municipal documents. The office also employs a full time Assistant Town Clerk and a part-time administrative aide. Our office provides a communication link between citizens and municipal government, guaranteeing residents access to information which is vital to their participation in the democratic process.

For two years, the annual census has been available to be answered through our website. The first year there were over 1200 responses and last year totaled over 1500. Our office also posts all meetings, agendas and minutes of meetings on the calendar section of the website.

OPERATIONS OF OFFICE: Responsible for handling all elections, federal, state and local from beginning to end. Tabulate results and report figures to necessary officials. Conduct absentee voting in the office and send out requested absentee ballots when requested. Coordinate voting lists with our election vendor, set up gymnasium for voting, coordinate police to cover Election Day and supervise poll workers during elections.

Maintain voter information system, register all new voters in town as well as new voters registering through the Registry of Motor Vehicles, complete Town census each year, print street lists, record, certify and file proceedings for all Town Meetings and report all Town Meeting information to the Attorney General and the Department of Revenue. Verify signatures of registered voters for all petitions and nominations which apply to this town and maintain copies of all campaign records.

Issue birth, death and marriage licenses, dog licenses and raffle permits, issue all Zoning Board and Planning decisions, notify applicants when the appeal time has elapsed, submit all birth, death and marriage records for residents each month to Vital Statistics in Boston and assist the public in genealogy searches when time permits and type certified birth, death and marriage certificates from those records. Prepare Business Certificates for all new businesses in Town; update and have available to the public Zoning By-Laws, General By-Laws and Planning Board Rules and Regulations. Collect all miscellaneous fines given out by various town departments as well as all Board of Health fines.

File minutes of all Boards, Committees and Commissions, as received; post meeting notices and agendas and maintain copies of them. Post all meeting notices and agendas on the Town website, if received from departments. Prepare annual budget and supervise and support an office staff skilled in customer service and information technology.

**TOWN OF MARSHFIELD
SPECIAL TOWN MEETING October 20, 2008**

Special Town Meeting was called to order at 7:30 PM on Monday, October 20, 2008 at Marshfield High School. All articles were voted on before town meeting was dissolved at 10:47PM. All articles were chosen via the lottery system and voted as follows: 15, 10, 2, 12, 5, 16, 17, 6, 8, 14, 4, 11, 13, 9, 7, 1, 3 and 18.

Town meeting workers included Charlotte, Keith, Kay Ramsey, Madelyn Radley, Narice Casper, Susan Flynn, Karen O'Donnell, Steve Barber and Barry Bartlett. Tellers were Jim Haddad, Jim Creed, Jack Cantwell, Barry Bartlett, Jean McDonald, Jack Braithwaite, Barry Cornwall, Reed Stewart, Otis Carney and Madeleine McDonald.

ARTICLE 1 The Town **VOTED** to appropriate \$0.00 to fund the creation of a Facilities Manager position as outlined in the Town of Marshfield Charter Article 4 Section 4-1-2 Facilities Manager and to meet said appropriation raise and appropriate \$0 from the FY 09 tax levy for the purpose of providing a salary and expenses to support the position, which include a comprehensive Town Wide Building Study.

ARTICLE 2 The Town **VOTED** to act upon the recommendation of the Community Preservation Committee for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008.

\$727,363 Swift Property parcel B16-01-17 915 Union Street 25+/- Acres Open Space/Recreation
\$727,363 is appropriated for all costs associated with the acquisition of parcel B16-01-17 – 915 Union Street as shown on the map on file in the Town Clerk's office; that to meet this appropriation: \$410,888 shall be transferred from the Community Preservation Open Space Reserve; and \$316,475 shall be transferred from the Community Preservation fund Balance; that the Board of Selectmen is authorized to grant a permanent deed restriction meeting the requirements of Chapter 184 of the General Laws limiting the property to the purpose for which it was acquired and that the Board of Selectmen is authorized to take any other action necessary to carry out this project which will include welcoming signage and primitive parking for 4 cars.
– Passed by 2/3 vote

\$50,000 Bennett Property parcel L05-31-25 Careswell Street 15+/- Acres Open Space/Recreation
\$50,000 is appropriated for all costs associated with the acquisition of parcel L05-31-25 – Careswell Street as shown on the map on file in the Town Clerk's office; that to meet this appropriation \$50,000 shall be transferred from the Community Preservation Fund Balance; that the Board of Selectmen is authorized to grant a permanent deed restriction meeting the requirements of Chapter 184 of the General Laws limiting the property to the purpose for which it was acquired; and that the Board of Selectmen is authorized to take any other action necessary to carry out this project.

\$544,000 "Buckles & Boards" parcels G08-05-04 , G08-05-05 2148 Ocean Street
1.48 +/- Acres Open Space/Recreation
\$544,000 is appropriated for all costs associated with the acquisition of parcels G08-05-04 and G08-05-05 – 2148 Ocean Street as shown on the map on file in the Town Clerk's office; that to meet this appropriation: \$544,000 shall be transferred from the Community Preservation Fund Balance; that the Board of Selectmen is authorized to grant a permanent deed restriction meeting the requirements of Chapter 184 of the General Laws limiting the property to the purpose for which it was acquired and that the Board of Selectmen is authorized to take any other action necessary to carry out this project.

- Passed by 2/3 vote (196 YES – 90 NO)

ARTICLE 3 The Town **VOTED** to appropriate \$50,000 from the FY09 tax levy to fund a comprehensive subsurface investigation at 1896 Ocean Street (former Gulf/Texaco service station) including a review of adjacent properties as follows:

1874 Ocean Street – adjacent property, 1900 Ocean Street – adjacent property,

1933 Ocean Street – Property across the street potentially up gradient

Comprehensive subsurface investigation shall include all testing, DEP compliance reporting and notification, sampling and investigations to determine what actions are necessary to render the property useable without any contamination over acceptable EPA standards.

ARTICLE 4 The Town **PASSED OVER** voting the sum of \$1,850,000 for the purpose of constructing pier improvements that consist of a new Harbormaster Facility, a new unloading facility and a pier extension with associated floats, said appropriation to include without limitation, all costs thereof and to meet said appropriation the Treasurer with approval of the Board of Selectmen is authorized to borrow the sum of money appropriated hereunder in accordance with Mass General Laws Chapter 44 and said appropriation and borrowing to be conditional on the receipt of a grant through the Seaport Advisory Council (SAC) Seaport Bond bill.

ARTICLE 5 The Town **VOTED** to appropriate \$1,653.10 from the FY09 tax levy for payment of unpaid bills incurred during the previous fiscal years.

ARTICLE 6 The Town **VOTED** pursuant to M.G.L. c. 82A§2, vote to authorize and designate the Board of Public Works to designate the Board or Officer to issue permits for the purpose of creating a "trench" as that term is defined by M.G.L. c. 82A §4 and 520 CMR 14.00.

ARTICLE 7 The Town **VOTED** that the charge for each written demand issued by the Collector a fee of \$5.00 to be added to and collected as part of the tax, as authorized by Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 60, Section 15, effective for fiscal year 2009 and forward.

ARTICLE 8 The Town **VOTED** to appropriate the sum of \$200,000 to acquire ownership in fee simple of Lot#G10-03-03 #318 Main Street to protect the Furnace Brook Aquifer well field drinking water source; that to meet this appropriation \$200,000 shall be transferred from the Water Enterprise Retained Earnings Account; that the Board of Public Works, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, is authorized to acquire such land on behalf of and in the name of the Town and to take any action relative thereto and to accept a Drinking Water Supply Protection Grant from the State Executive Office of Environmental Affairs, the proceeds of which shall be transferred to the Water Enterprise Retained Earnings account; that the Board of Selectmen is authorized to grant a permanent deed restriction meeting the requirements of Chapter 184 of the General Laws limiting the property to the purpose for which it was acquired; that said parcel shall be subject to the provisions of Article 97 of the State Constitution; and that the Board of Selectmen and Board of Public Works be authorized, as they deem appropriate, to enter into all agreements and execute any and all instruments necessary to effectuate the purpose of this vote, to incur legal or other costs related with the acquisition of such property and to take any other action necessary to carry out this project

ARTICLE 9 The Town **VOTED** to appropriate \$ 26,000 to be used for the removal of the so called Parco Valve pump start/stop control for Furnace Brook Well #2 and replacing it with a Variable Frequency Drive as part of the UV system installation and to meet the cost of such appropriation by transferring \$26,000 from Water Retained Earnings.

ARTICLE 10 The Town **PASSED OVER** amending the vote of the Town passed April 24, 2007 (Article 4) to reduce the appropriation and borrowing authorization of \$360,000 for the purpose of the Telegraph Hill Drainage to \$179,000 and to change the purpose of the remaining \$181,000 of the original appropriation and borrowing authorization to the Rexhame/Fieldston drainage ditch reconstruction and culvert replacement.

ARTICLE 11 The Town **PASSED OVER** appropriating \$150,000 by borrowing and to meet such appropriation to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to issue any bonds or notes that may be necessary for that purpose as authorized by M.G.L. Chapter 44 or any other enabling authority, the Town's 50% matching share, for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to conduct a Hurricane and Storm Damage Reduction Feasibility Study for the Fieldston and Brant Rock sections of Marshfield.

ARTICLE 12 The Town **PASSED OVER** approving the decision of the Board of Public works to allocate \$300,000 of available Chapter 90 funds for the purpose of reconstructing sidewalks and curbing in Snow Road.

ARTICLE 13 The Town **PASSED OVER** authorizing the acquisition by eminent domain under the provisions of Chapter 79 of the Massachusetts General Laws with no land damages to be paid therefor, of a certain parcel of land on the northeasterly side of Snow Road containing approximately 255 square feet.

ARTICLE 14 The Town **VOTED** to authorize the expenditure of \$126,250 from Insurance Recovery Proceeds to replace the excavator that was submerged in the Avon Street Marsh on April 7 & 8, 2008 and declared a total loss by the Town's Insurer.

ARTICLE 15 The Town **VOTED** to **WITHDRAW** the article transferring \$100,461 to restore funding for salaries for positions lost by the DPW in the Fiscal Year 2009 budget.

ARTICLE 16 The Town **DEFEATED** appropriating \$40,000 for construction, renovation, expansion of Ventress Memorial Library. All construction, renovation and expansion to be limited to \$40,000 for completion of the entire project. – **Defeated 107 YES-138 NO**

ARTICLE 17 The Town **DEFEATED** adopting the following addition to the Zoning Bylaws:
Defeated 134 YES-70 NO (2/3 vote required for passage)

Section 12.03 – Sustainable Development

The purpose of this Section is to create means and methods to review land use proposals and avoid overburdening the Town's natural resources or capacities of existing and planned public services and facilities, particularly with respect to provision of potable water, wastewater disposal, solid waste disposal and the provision of emergency and other services.

1. The proponent of any residential development permitted under existing bylaws, excluding developments of 6 (six) or fewer residential units to be constructed without variances from existing bylaws, shall be required to submit figures on projected demands upon services and schools. These projections shall include numbers and types of police and fire responses to the proposed development on an annualized basis. The standards for the form, content and basis of the projections shall be according to requirements and standards developed by the Permit Granting Authority in cooperation with the heads of the departments and the department of public works. This data shall be made available by the proponent to the Permit Granting Authority in a timely fashion during the application process so that it is available for review by any department or agency of the town from which binding or advisory opinions are sought from the Permit Granting Authority. Failure to comply shall constitute a violation of the Bylaws.

ARTICLE 18 The Town **VOTED** to appropriate the amount of \$5,000 from the FY09 tax levy to provide for supporting the action of the complaint filed by the town at and listed in Plymouth Superior Court as Civil Action No. PLVC 2007-1279 B regarding what has come to be known as the "Beacon 40B" project on Ocean Street in Rexhame? Said funds to be used and with the aim of providing for: the protection and preservation of recognized state-listed endangered species and their habitats; wetlands, vernal pools and appropriate protection and management of Flood Plains, as defined by local ordinances and the state and federal government; and the pursuit of any other concerns of the town or objectives under jurisdiction of the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act and Endangered Species Act, or any other related concerns, stemming from the referenced Matter. This action to be conducted in cooperation with the Party of the Petitioners of the ongoing Ten Resident Appeal of record and the Residents' Complaint filed in Plymouth Superior Court in the Matter.

ARTICLE 18 The Town *VOTED* to amend the General bylaws by adding the following new bylaw:

ARTICLE EIGHTY-EIGHT

Entry Upon Premises and Removal of Combustible Materials; to be Remedied; Penalty

The head of the fire department or any member to whom the head of the fire department may delegate, may upon complaint of a person having an interest in any building or premises or property adjacent thereto, shall, at any reasonable hour, enter into buildings and upon premises, which term for the purposes of the remainder of this section shall include alleys adjacent thereto, within their jurisdiction and make an investigation as to the existence of conditions likely to cause fire. They shall, in writing, order such conditions to be remedied, and whenever such officers or persons find in any building or upon any premises any accumulation of combustible rubbish including, but not limited to, waste paper, rags, cardboard, string, packing material, sawdust, shavings, sticks, waste leather or rubber, broken boxes or barrels or any other refuse or useable materials that is or may become dangerous as a fire menace or as an obstacle to easy ingress into or egress from such buildings or premises, they shall, in writing, order the same to be removed or such conditions to be remedied. Notice of such order shall be served upon the owner, occupant or his authorized agent by a member of the fire or police department. If said order is not complied with within twenty-four hours, the person making such order, or any person designated by him, may enter into such building or upon such premises and remove such refuse or any useable materials or abate such conditions at the expense of such owner or occupant. Any expense so incurred by or on behalf of the town, shall be a debt due the town, as the case may be, upon completion of such removal or abatement and the rendering of an account therefore to the owner. The provisions of the second paragraph of section three A of chapter one hundred and thirty-nine, relative to liens for such debt and the collection of the claims for such debt, shall apply to any debt referred to in this section, except that the head of the fire department shall act hereunder in place of the board of selectmen. Any such owner or occupant who fails or refuses to comply with said order shall be punished by a fine of \$100 for the first offense, \$200 for the second offense and \$300 for the third and subsequent offenses.

Whoever violates any provision of this bylaw, the violation of which is subject to a specific penalty, may be penalized by the non-criminal method of disposition as provided in Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 21D and Article 2 of the Marshfield General Bylaws.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 19 The Town *VOTED* to amend the General bylaws by adding the following new bylaw:

ARTICLE EIGHTY-NINE

OPEN BURNING

No person shall set, maintain or increase a fire in the open air at any time except by permission, granted by the forest warden/chief of the fire department or his designee. A written record of the granting thereof, setting forth the date upon which permission was granted, the dates covered by such permission, the name and address of the person to whom, and the manner in which, such permission was granted, and any other necessary information relative thereto, shall be made and kept by the forest warden/chief and be at the location where the burning will occur. Persons eighteen years of age or older may, without a permit, set, maintain or increase a reasonable fire for the purpose of cooking, on privately owned land if the fire is enclosed within rocks, metal or other nonflammable material. The forest warden/chief shall make it a condition for granting a permit that any burning shall be in compliance with Massachusetts General Law Chapter 48 Section 13 and may make it a condition for granting such permit that sufficient fire department personnel, to be assigned at the expense of the person seeking such permit, shall be present at such burning to control the fire until it is entirely extinguished. Any permit granted under this section may be revoked at any time. Whoever violates any provision of this section shall be punished by a fine of \$100 for the first offense, \$200 for the second offense and \$300 for the third and subsequent offenses.

Whoever violates any provision of this bylaw, the violation of which is subject to a specific penalty, may be penalized by the non-criminal method of disposition as provided in Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 21D and Article 2 of the Marshfield General Bylaws.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 20 The Town *VOTED* to amend the General bylaws by adding the following new bylaw:

ARTICLE NINETY

Piling Snow on Fire Hydrants and Fire Protection Devices Prohibited; Penalty

No person other than an employee in the service of the commonwealth or the town or in the service of an independent contractor acting for the commonwealth or the town shall pile, push or plow snow or ice on or against any fire hydrant or fire protection device used for fire protection which is located in any public or private way so as to conceal such hydrant or device or cover any outlet thereof. Whoever violates this section shall be punished by a fine of \$300.

Whoever violates any provision of this bylaw, the violation of which is subject to a specific penalty, may be penalized by the non-criminal method of disposition as provided in Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 21D and Article 2 of the Marshfield General Bylaws.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 21 The Town *VOTED* to amend the General bylaws by adding the following new bylaw:

ARTICLE NINETY-ONE

Shut off, Disconnect, Obstruction, Removal or Destruction of a Fire Protection Devices; Permit; Report; Violation; Enforcement

Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall shut off, disconnect, obstruct, remove or destroy, or cause or permit to be shut off, disconnected, obstructed, removed or destroyed, any part of any sprinkler system, water main, hydrant or other device used for fire protection/detection or carbon monoxide detection and alarm in any building owned, leased or occupied by such person or under his control or supervision, without first procuring a written permit so to do from the head of the fire department, which permit such head is hereby authorized to issue subject to such terms and conditions as, in his judgment, protection against fire and the preservation of the public safety may require. This section shall not prevent the temporary shutting off or disconnection or partial removal of such a system, main, hydrant or other device for the purpose of making necessary repairs or preventing freezing or other property damage; provided, however, that the head of the fire department is notified immediately of such emergency action. The head of the fire department shall also be notified when the system, main, hydrant or other device is placed back in service. Violation of this section shall be punished by a fine of \$150 for the first offense and \$300 for the second offense.

Whoever violates any provision of this bylaw, the violation of which is subject to a specific penalty, may be penalized by the non-criminal method of disposition as provided in Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 21D and Article 2 of the Marshfield General Bylaws.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 22 The Town *VOTED* to amend the Marshfield Zoning Bylaw, Article XII Special Regulations, Section 12.02 Site Plan Approval (5), by inserting the word "procedural" into the first sentence. The new section 12.02 (5) would read as follows:

5. In exercising its jurisdiction under this Section, the Board shall conform to all **procedural** requirements applicable to the Board when deciding requests for special permits as set forth in General Laws Chapter 40A, Section 9 and Article X of this Bylaw.

PASSED BY 2/3 VOTE

ARTICLE 23 The Town *VOTED* to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 from FY2010 tax levy for the purpose of providing Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Vouchers for services rendered pursuant to an agreement to be formulated between the Council on Aging and the Board of Selectmen.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 24

Item 1 - Community Housing - Affordable Housing Coordinator: The Town *VOTED* to act upon the recommendation of the Community Preservation Committee for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, to appropriate \$65,000 from FY2010 Community Preservation Fund revenues established pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44B to fund the compensation of a Housing Coordinator to support and implement the Affordable Housing Plan submitted by the Affordable Housing Partnership.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

Item 2 - Community Housing - Expenses for Conversion: The Town *VOTED* to act upon the recommendation of the Community Preservation Committee for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, to expend \$89,376 of which \$26,828 will be appropriated from the Community Housing Reserve and \$62,548 will be appropriated from the FY2010 Community Preservation Fund revenues established pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44B to fund expenses related to the conversion of existing market rate housing to affordable housing.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

Items 3-7 - The Town *VOTED* to appropriate \$63,774 from FY2010 Community Preservation Fund revenues for Administrative Expenses, reserve \$127,548 from FY2010 Community Preservation Fund revenues for Open Space, reserve \$127,548 from FY2010 Community Preservation Fund revenues for Historic Resources, reserve \$0 from FY2010 Community Preservation Fund revenues for Community Housing and reserve \$829,066 from FY2010 Community Preservation Fund revenues for Budgeted Reserve.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 25 The Town *VOTED* to transfer \$80,000 from Waterways Improvement Fund and borrow the sum of \$320,000 for the purpose of constructing pier improvements that consist of a new unloading facility and a pier extension with associated floats, said appropriation to include without limitation, all costs thereof and to meet said appropriation the Treasurer with approval of the Board of Selectmen is authorized to borrow the sum of money appropriated hereunder in accordance with MASS General Laws Chapter 44 and said appropriation and borrowing to be conditional on the receipt of a grant in the amount of at least \$320,000 through the Seaport Advisory Council (SAC) Seaport Bond bill.

PASSED BY 2/3 VOTE

ARTICLE 26 The Town *VOTED* to prohibit smoking on all Marshfield public beaches, post this ordinance at beach entrances, and impose a penalty for its violation not exceeding a fine of \$25.00

PASSED BY MAJORITY / YES - 249 NO - 136

ARTICLE 27 The Town *VOTED* to direct the Marshfield Airport Commission to set landing fees at the Town owned Airport after July 1, 2009.

Landing fees and exemptions subject to annual adjustments by the Airport Commission.

Fee schedule:

6,000 to 12,499 lbs. \$1.50 per thousand pounds, rounded off

12,500 lbs. and over \$2.50 per thousand pounds, rounded off.

Military/Government operations are exempt from landing fees. All medical aircraft operations are exempt from landing fees.

All jets regardless of weight or where they are based are subject to the landing fee.

ARTICLE 28 The Town *PASSED OVER* raising or appropriating or transferring from available funds, the sum of \$3,500 to contract with South Shore Women's Resource Center for domestic violence intervention and prevention services for its residents.

ARTICLE 29 The Town *VOTED* to transfer the sum of \$1,700 from Free Cash for the support of the Clift Rodgers Free Library and YWCA, Marshfield Branch, the sum to be divided equally.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 30 The Town *PASSED OVER* raising and appropriating the sum of \$5,000 from available funds for the support of the Clift Rodgers Free Library and the, Marshfield Branch YWCA, the sum to be divided equally?

ARTICLE 31 The Town *VOTED* to transfer from Free Cash the total sum of \$2,550 to contract with the following three Non-Profit Organizations (NPOs), as set forth herein, for services to Marshfield residents:

1. South Shore Women's Resource Center, (\$850) for domestic violence intervention and prevention services;
2. Womansplace Crisis Center, (\$850) services for victims of sexual assault; and
3. South Coastal Counties Legal Services, (\$850) for free legal civil matters services (i.e. housing, tenant/landlord) to low income families and their children.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 32 The Town *VOTED* to renegotiate the contract/lease between the Town of Marshfield and Shoreline Aviation regarding the operations and management of the Town owned Municipal Airport ASAP.

PASSED BY MAJORITY / YES – 87 NO 55

ARTICLE 33 The Town *DEFEATED* reducing the percentage of taxation of the Community Preservation Act from 3% to .5%.

DEFEATED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 34 The Town *VOTED* to require the energy committee appointed by the Selectmen to report to the Fall Special Town Meeting relative to their efforts toward the timely construction of wind turbines located in the Town of Marshfield.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 35 The Town *DEFEATED* raising and appropriating the sum of \$10,000 from Free Cash for construction, renovation, expansion of Ventress Memorial Library by installing a doorway into the adjacent building.

DEFEATED BY MAJORITY / YES – 53 NO 81

ARTICLE 36 The Town *PASSED OVER* amending the Zoning Bylaw Article VII Signs as follows:

1. By inserting the following new paragraph after the first paragraph in section 7.02 (3) that will regulate Temporary Signs.

In any Business, Industrial, Office park, PMUD or Airport Zoning District all Temporary signs shall comply with the following requirements;

- a. Temporary business signs may be authorized by the Building Commissioner, subject to the applicable sign permit application and fees.
- b. Temporary signs shall be authorized by the Building Commissioner subject to the following requirements listed in this section. Temporary signs shall be constructed and erected in accordance

with the requirements of the Building Commissioner. Temporary signs shall be used as a means of advertizing products, services or special events. Temporary sign permits shall have a start and removal date, not to exceed 30 days.

Temporary signs shall not exceed 3 feet in width and 4 feet in height, and shall not exceed 12 square feet per side. Businesses shall not be allowed more than one temporary sign at one time.

- c. All signs shall be located on the same property as the business and shall be located on private property, unless authorized by the Building Commissioner.
- d. A "New Business Opening" temporary sign is allowed for a period not to exceed 30 days, one week prior to opening and three weeks after opening.

2. By amending the Zoning Bylaw Article VII Signs by inserting the following new section 7.04(6) that will regulate window signs.

7.04(6) Window Signs

Signs painted or placed on the inside or outside of the glass of a window or otherwise located in an opening so as to be visible from the exterior shall be permitted in any Business, Industrial, Office park, PMUD or Airport Zoning District, provided that the total aggregate area of the window sign shall not exceed 25 percent of the area of the window glass or of the opening. Signs of this nature shall conform in all respects with Section 7.01, Section 7.02, Section 7.04 and Section 7.05.

3. By amending the Zoning Bylaw Article VII Signs by inserting the following new paragraph after the first paragraph in section 7.04(2) that will regulate signs on large buildings:

7.04(2) In any Business, Industrial, Office Park, PMUD or Airport Zoning District all signs shall comply with the following requirements for large building signs;

If the total area of a building's wall or façade exceeds 400 sq. ft., the surface area of the flush mounted wall sign shall not exceed 100 square feet or 10 percent of the area of the wall or façade, whichever is less.

Special Town Meeting, Monday, April 27, 2009

Marshfield's Annual Town Meeting was called to order on Monday, April 27, 2009 at Marshfield High School. The meeting was convened at 7:55 PM and Article 26 was voted. Annual Town Meeting was adjourned at 8:10 PM and Special Town Meeting was convened. Articles 7,10,11,13,12,3,6,5,16,18 and 19 were voted and Special Town Meeting was adjourned at 10:32PM. STM reconvened at 7:30 PM on Tuesday, April 28, 2009 and Articles 15,9,14,4,2,1,17 and 8 were voted. Special Town Meeting was adjourned and Annual Town Meeting was convened at 8:30 PM. Articles 1-6 and 33 were voted and ATM was adjourned at 10:48 PM. ATM reconvened on Thursday, April 30, 2009 at 7:30 PM. Articles 19,18,20,21,28,29,30,31,27,14,12,13,32,17,22,29,15,16,7,11,35 and 34 were voted and ATM was adjourned at 10:30 PM. Annual Town Meeting was reconvened at 7:30 PM on Monday, May 4, 2009. Articles 23,10,36,9,8,24,25 and 5 were voted. Annual Town Meeting was dissolved at 9:45 PM.

ARTICLE 11 The Town **VOTED** to authorize the Board of Public Works, on behalf of and in the name of the Town, to acquire ownership in fee simple of the below described parcel of land for the purposes of protection of the Webster Well Aquifer well field drinking water source, and to expend \$450,050 from the Water Enterprise Retained Earnings, and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen, to grant a permanent deed restriction meeting the requirements of General Laws Chapter 184 limiting the property to the purpose for which it was acquired and that the Board of Selectmen and Board of Public Works be authorized, as they deem appropriate, to enter into all agreements and execute any and all instruments necessary to effectuate the purpose of this article. Said deed restrictions may be granted to any organization qualified and willing to hold such a restriction. Said Parcel shall be subject to the provisions of Article 97 of the State Constitution. Further, will the Town authorize the Board of Public Works to accept a Drinking Water Supply Protection Grant from the State Executive Office of Environmental Affairs, the proceeds of which shall be transferred into the Water Enterprise Retained Earnings account. Town Counsel approve all plans prior to registry filing.

ARTICLE 12 The Town **VOTED** to authorize the acquisition by eminent domain under the provisions of Chapter 79 of the Massachusetts General Laws with no land damages to be paid therefore, a certain parcel of land on the northeasterly side of Snow Road containing approximately 255 square feet, shown on a plan drawn by Stenbeck and Taylor, Inc. Marshfield, Mass. and on file with the Town Clerk's Office. Town Counsel shall approve all plans prior to filing at the registry.

ARTICLE 13 The Town **VOTED** to relocate the layout of Snow Road from Stratton Avenue to Webster Street as a Public Way under the provisions of Chapter 82 of the Massachusetts General Laws, and to authorize the acquisition of land by eminent domain necessary to such relocation under the provisions of Chapter 79 of the Massachusetts General Laws, with no damages to be paid therefore; all as shown on a plan drawn by Stenbeck & Taylor, Inc., Marshfield, Massachusetts and on file in the Town Clerk's Office, and further to transfer the discontinued portion of Snow Road as it currently exists from the custody and control of the Board of Public Works to the Board of Selectmen, a portion of such discontinuance to be dedicated to the use for public vehicular access to abutting parcels and parking, as shown on such plan. Town Counsel shall approve all plans prior to filing at the registry.

PASSED BY 2/3 VOTE

ARTICLE 14 The Town **VOTED** to authorize the Board of Public Works to take by eminent domain a drainage and utility easement, with no land damages to be paid therefor, for the purpose of installation, upgrading, reconstructing and maintaining drainage structures, and public utilities consisting of approximately 450 sq. ft. area on Assessors Parcel K10-19-01 and approximately 450 sq. ft. area on Parcel K10-19-35A as shown on a plan "Drainage and Utility Easement at Bass Creek and Ocean Street to be taken by Town of Marshfield", dated February 12, 2009 by Hoyt Land Surveying of Weymouth, MA filed with the Town Clerk.

PASSED BY 2/3 VOTE

ARTICLE 15 The Town **VOTED** to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant a non exclusive 15 foot wide electrical utility easement to NSTAR Electric Company within the layout of Eames Way and as shown on Plan: "Plan Showing Proposed NSTAR Electrical Easement Town of Marshfield, MA" dated September 8, 2008 by Hoyt Land Surveying, Weymouth, MA and filed with the Town Clerk.

PASSED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 16 The Town **VOTED** to act upon the recommendation of the Community Preservation Committee to expend \$250,000 from the Community Preservation Fund established pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 44B by transferring \$77,391 from the Budgeted Reserve and transferring \$ 172,609 from the Community Preservation Fund Balance for the purposes of the construction of a community playground at the current Library Plaza with such money to be expended for playground equipment, surfacing, landscaping and other costs associated with the construction of said playground.

PASSED BY MAJORITY / YES - 275 NO - 142

ARTICLE 17 The Town **DEFEATED** establishing a General By-Law which states the following: "The hunting of any wildlife on lands controlled by the Marshfield Conservation Commission shall be prohibited".

DEFEATED BY MAJORITY

ARTICLE 18 The Town **DEFEATED** considering the preservation and care of its natural resources, including lands to be deeded to the Town of Marshfield, the Town establish a Special Study Group or, in the alternative, Ad Hoc Committee, subject to the conditions below, to address the Matter pertaining to what is known as the Beacon 40B project proposal, now before the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Superior Court, Civil Division under docket PLCV07-1280B.

The Study Group, or Committee shall consist of five members, two appointed by the Moderator and three provided by the "Residents Group" in the above referenced matter. The Committee shall be continue unimpeded by any Board or other Committee in the Town; report to the next Special Town Meeting and be subject to reauthorization of a subsequent Special Town Meeting. The Committee shall convene as soon as practicable and as soon as a quorum is in place, after the close of the Special Town Meeting. The Committee shall perform in an advisory capacity, to ensure the open disclosure of efforts and spending. The Committee shall conduct open meetings as needed on the status and progress of any litigation and technical matters relating to wildlife habitat protection and related subjects, connected to the above referenced Matter and resulting from 1) Any Remand ordered by the Superior Court, and 2) The ongoing monitoring of the subject proposed development project.

The Committee and efforts shall be supported by the appropriation of \$20,000 raised from the Free Cash. Said funds to be used to support the costs of litigation and consulting fees in any potential Remand in the above referenced Matter and in full and complete cooperation with, the "Ten Residents" of the Matter.

Invoices for technical and litigation support shall be submitted to and paid by the Town Treasurer following review and approval of the Committee.

DEFEATED BY MAJORITY / NO - 168 YES - 141

ARTICLE 19 The Town **DEFEATED** that the Airport Commission shall consist of seven (7) members. A minimum of 5 members shall live within 1,500 feet of the airport runway, or below and within the approach and take-off zones for the runways defined by the areas extending 2 miles from the ends of the runways and bounded by the extended lines of the Runway Protection Zones (RPZ's) as defined by applicable federal regulations. The Airport Commission shall appoint and maintain a permanent Citizen's Advisory Committee of seven (7) members to be appointed on a schedule parallel to that of the Commissioners.
